Its shape was still very much based on the Roman spatha with a tight grip, long deep fuller and no pronounced cross-guard. It was not exclusive to the Vikings, but rather was used throughout Europe

Several Viking swords are also found in the British Isles, Mainland Europe, Russia and the Baltics. A typical sword has a blade that measures 70 to 90 centimeters (27.5 – 35.4 in) – and may have one or two edges. Single edges were common at the start of the Viking Age, but in the 800s and 900s AD, two edges became common.

Swords of the Viking Age - Boydell and Brewer

Swords in the Viking age were typically double edged; both edges of the blade were sharp. Swords were generally used single handed, since the other hand was busy holding the shield. Blades ranged from 60 to 90cm (24-36 in) long, although 70-80cm was typical. Late in the Viking era, blades became as long as 100cm

Viking Swords - Hurstwic

By far the most common weapon used by the Scandinavians and the Anglo-Saxons alike was the spear. Spears in the Viking Age were typically between 7' (213 cm) and 11' (335 cm) in overall length, with the blade length of the spearhead being as short as 3" (7.6 cm) for lighter javelins, and up to sizes of 18" (46 cm) for thrusting spears.
